Since the culture around her wasn't conducive to "big" girls like her going to school, she only attended classes occasionally.

As a 14-year-old a few years later, she moved again, and she was glad it was to the United States. She was able to attend school again! As she finished the eighth grade, she started dreaming about starting high school. She knew she wanted to be a nurse in the neo-natal unit and work with babies. Her teacher had helped her plan a course of study in that direction.

It wasn't far into her high school education that her heart was crushed. Her dad sat her down and told her she was too old to waste her days sitting in a classroom with her head buried in a book. She cried herself to sleep many nights after that. Her heart ached as she watched her younger siblings head out the door and down the road to school. She felt pangs of envy in the evenings when they sat at the table doing their homework. Why did she have to miss out?
