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ARMAGEDDON NEWS

We would have the readership assured that, despite our absence from the printed page, Armageddon has raged on, and we returned to our desk quite inundated with field reports exposing nearly every outrage known to mankind. From these, we have selected a few. And so, we present the news!

On the Road to Enlightenment?

Pakistan's National Assembly has passed a resolution condemning lynchings in the majority Muslim country, the *Arab News* has reported. Impetus for the resolution was created in part by the recent lynching of a tourist in the Swat Valley of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province and elsewhere. The man, vaguely accused of "desecrating the Holy Qu'ran," was pulled by a mob from the local police station, tortured and set ablaze.

"The House believes that the right to life is the most cherished right as enshrined in the Constitution of Pakistan." A statement from the resolution, which passed unanimously, reads: "Every person is to be dealt with in accordance with the law and not otherwise." An enlightened point of view, surely.

But before our readers rejoice at this apparent repudiation of barbaric injustice, we do well to remind them that "the

law" mentioned in the resolution itself allows for the taking of one's life for merely insulting Islam or the prophet Mohammed. Only they have a right to live who do not offend Muslim sensibilities. Blasphemy laws still rule in Pakistan.

There is a difference in the minds of the good people of the National Assembly, however, between a person being executed by a mob on the streets or by the mob of the legal system. One mustn't rob Caesar of his right to pronounce sentence.

Touch Not the Transgender Idol or Else!

When Dr. Eithan Haim saw with his own eyes what was happening at Texas Children's Hospital (TCH) last year, he felt he had to do something to expose it. The 34-year-old surgical resident noticed that TCH continued to clandestinely offer gender-affirming care to minors, contrary to Governor Greg Abbott's order banning such care and the hospital's own public statements that they were in compliance with the order. So, Dr. Haim accessed medical records and leaked evidence showing the hospital's violations to journalist Christopher Rufo at *City Journal*. Rufo published the story, and now the doctor is facing a four-count indictment from the US Department of Justice and a potential sentence of 10 years for violating US medical privacy laws. At least, that is the pretense for the lawsuit.

Rufo maintains that personal information was redacted from the data Dr. Haim leaked to him, but any unauthorized accessing and releasing of a patient's medical records is a violation of medical

privacy laws. A legal defense fund set up for Dr. Haim had reached over \$865,000 of its \$1 million goal by the time of writing.

In addition to this, FBI agents recently visited, intimidated, and threatened Vanessa Sivadge, a Texas nurse who separately blew the whistle on the harm being done to children in the TCH's transgender clinic. It appears the Biden administration is moving the muscle of its legal and law enforcement arms to strike down any who would dare touch its sacred idol of transgenderism.

language, has been made exponentially easier by the internet. The access to unlimited information and knowledge has enabled us to learn, attempt, and accomplish things we couldn't have dreamed of

before. Through these technologies, we have access to innumerable opportunities to do good and improve the lives of our fellow man.

But with all its benefits, these technologies have also acquainted humanity with unsurpassed opportunities for evil. The damage these technologies have brought with them is becoming more and more evident. And with younger and younger children having access to the internet on their personal devices, these effects are becoming both more pronounced and irreversible.

GOD HATH MADE ME TO LAUGH

“GOD HATH MADE ME TO LAUGH, so that all that hear will laugh with me.”
Genesis 21:6.

These are the words of Sarah, Abraham’s wife, who had just experienced a most wonderful happening—the birth of Isaac, her son! His name actually means “laughter”! Expectedly, there would be much laughter in Sarah’s circle of friends, for laughter is a concerted and contagious practice. And who was making it happen? God!

There are several principles, concerning laughter, to be gleaned from this verse of Scripture: Firstly, laughter comes from God. This “inborn gift,” is soon revealed by an infant’s smile within the first weeks after birth, followed by an audible laugh within months. Indeed, “laughter is [our] birthright.”

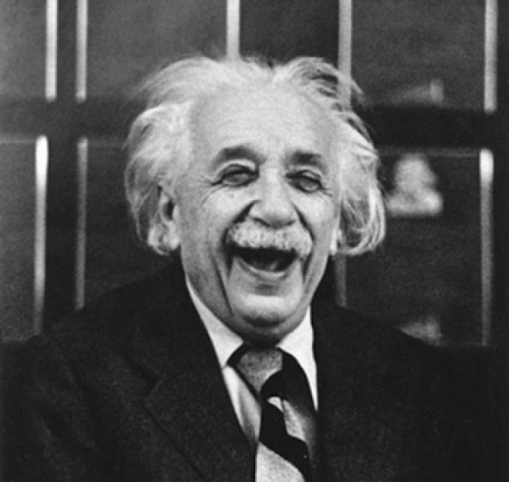
Secondly, God creates situations that make us laugh. He has a sense of humor. Why else would He have given a puppy that wagging tail or the raccoon that detective’s mask!¹ God is involved in our joys

and takes pleasure in our laughter.

Thirdly, it is worth noticing that God makes even older people laugh. While children’s laughter occurs spontaneously many times a day, laughter becomes less frequent in adulthood, when life’s burdens and trials prompt a more serious outlook. Enter: children, grandchildren, family, friends—what a difference they make, lifting the hearts of the elderly with laughter and possibly thereby adding a few more years to their life.²

Lastly, laughter possesses a power of attraction that “brings people together and strengthens relationships.” This is one good reason why we ought not to walk down the street, staring at our cell phone. Smiling at the people we meet can create opportunities to talk, laugh, and connect one with another. “Laughter is a universal connection,” explains Y. Smirnoff; “everybody laughs the same in every language.” It is “the closest distance between two people,” reflects Victory Borge. How beautiful!

But this is a grim and dismal world!



Why not laugh a little more? Studies show that fifteen minutes of laughter each day equals the benefit of two hours of sleep. Laughing can act as a natural pain killer, releasing a chemical ten times more powerful than the pain-relieving drug morphine.

How can we laugh when the powers of darkness are threatening us on every front! Truly, were it not for God on His eternal throne, we would have reason to despair. However, Psalm 2 encourages us that God is sitting in the heavens laughing in derision at the futile, preposterous moves of the kings of the earth, tiny worms that they are! And when God laughs, we laugh with Him—not at humanity’s untold suffering caused by the “vain imaginations” of the wicked, but in defiance against those who want our demise. So, let us laugh when we gather for joyous celebrations, when we visit around the dinner table, when we play with our children! “There’s an intimacy in laughter that nothing else can come close to” (Eric Mabius). What’s more, “true laughter...destroys any kind of system of dividing people” (John Cleese)! Ah, we can combat the corruptive agendas of the elite by the powerful slogan: “Be happy! It drives them crazy!”—but does us well! “A merry heart doeth good like a medicine,” said King Solomon. In truth, our circulatory system is benefited, our immune system is strengthened, our muscles become more relaxed, the negative effects of stress are counteracted,

calories are burned, our mood is heightened, good feelings are promoted—all by the positive effects of laughter.²

Have we not reason to rejoice, to laugh? Have we not been “delivered out of the hand of our enemies [to serve God] without fear in holiness and righteousness before Him, all the days of our life” (Luke 1:75)? Has not the Lord “filled our mouth with laughter” (Psa. 126:2) when He turned our captivity and brought us home to Zion, the “city of our solemnities” (Isa. 33:20)? Strong’s concordance notes that the term “solemnities” refers to “festivals or solemn feasts”; the Hebrew word for “feasts” indicates, among other things, “to move in a circle, by implication to be giddy; celebrate, dance, to reel to and fro.” In conjunction with these definitions, Apostle S. Hargrave concludes that, since Christ came to fulfill these Old Testament feasts, we now, as the church in the new dispensation can respond with merriment also.

To be sure, laughter belongs to God’s people. To reiterate again the words of Apostle Hargrave: why should the world be permitted to have its fun now, and we, the saints, are to wait until heaven? Nay, this great salvation was not given us to make us sad. Who would want to hop on our boat, if we all wear long faces! By the way, God gave us a smile to wear regularly, not just on picture day or on special occasions. After all, as someone said, “we are His work of art.” God’s art gallery, of all others, should spark the greatest attraction! May we prompt a beautiful reaping

of souls by our demonstration of Christ’s fullness of joy!

“To everything there is a season...a time to weep, and a time to laugh” (Eccl. 3:1, 4). In all of life’s “ebbs and flows,” providentially allowed by God, let us not forget that God has made us to laugh. Jesus Himself, though called a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief, testified of His joy and, no doubt, expressed it through laughter, for example, when taking the children into His arms or when eating and drinking in company with others. Neither did He expect His disciples to mourn while He, the Bridegroom was with them. And, is not Immanuel, God in the flesh through the church, primarily through His apostles and prophets with us, also? Even unto the end of the world will He remain with us! Surely, we too then, can exclaim, “God hath made me to laugh!” 📷

Remote Amazon Tribe Gets Internet Access

EXCERPTS FROM A REPORT BY JAMES CORBETT

In June of 2023, the Marubo, a remote Amazon tribe of around 2,000 people, were supplied with Starlink antennae to connect to the internet.

This connection was immediately damaging to the community: "It changed the routine so much that it was detrimental. In the village, if you don't hunt, fish and plant, you don't eat." Instead, teenagers were spending their time on social media networks, watching soccer videos and chatting on Instagram. Young men, meanwhile, immediately gravitated toward pornography, a fact Enoque finds particularly disturbing. Some leaders said they had already observed more aggressive sexual behavior from young men.

As a result, internet use has been limited. The antennae are switched on only two hours in the morning, five hours in the evening, and all day on Sundays. This confirms what we already know: the internet can ruin a society in a matter of months.

"Everyone is so connected that sometimes they don't even talk to their own family," laments Alfredo Marubo, leader of one association of Marubo villages.

"Young people have gotten lazy because of the internet," complains Tsaina-ma Marubo, a 73-year-old tribal elder. Instead of learning the orally transmitted traditions of Marubo culture, the youth are only interested in "learning the ways of the white people."

The New York Post reported: "Remote Amazon tribe finally connects to inter-

net—only to wind up hooked on porn, social media!"

From its very inception, the internet was a creation of the military-industrial complex and the alphabet soup agencies that was always intended as a tool for tracking, surveilling and controlling any would-be opposition to the Silicon Valley overlords.

By their own admission, the pioneers of social media deliberately engineered their algorithms to exploit vulnerabilities in human psychology and make their platforms as addictive as humanly possible. These same social media mavens concede that social media is "ripping apart society." By and large, all the Big Tech CEOs

raise their children tech-free or greatly restrict their children's screen time.

We know, as one of the earliest viral internet videos has it, "The Internet is For Porn," and that pornography is a neurological weapon rewiring the brains of an entire generation of men in ways neurologically indistinguishable from severe drug addiction. Porn has actually been used as a weapon of demoralization, as when the Israelis seized three Palestinian television stations and began "broadcast-

ing pornographic movies and programs in Hebrew." (And is it any wonder that Elon Musk has just tweaked Twitter's rules to formally allow adult content on the platform?)

The average American now spends 11 hours per day listening to, watching, reading or generally interacting with media. In some fundamental sense, humans are already some amalgamation of human and electronic media, some species of homo medias that no longer remembers what it is to live an authentic human experience in the natural world.

The internet is increasingly a vile and divisive place that is tearing society apart at the seams.

Perhaps it's appropriate to give the last word today to the Marubo.

Decades ago, the most respected Marubo shaman had visions of a handheld device that could connect with the entire world. "It would be for the good of the people," he said. "But in the end, it wouldn't be."

"In the end," he added, "there would be war."

His son sat on the log across from him, listening. "I think the internet will bring us much more benefit than harm," Enoque said, "at least for now."

Regardless, he added, going back was no longer an option. "The leaders have been clear," he said. "We can't live without the internet." 📱

When one understands how addiction physically shrinks the brain's frontal cortex—the part of the brain that regulates impulse control—it is alarming to think of the possible life-long impact this is having on children whose brains are still developing.

Study after study is showing that we are perpetually more depressed, anxious, suicidal, addicted, and lonely. The connection of this problem with technology and the internet is also becoming increasingly acknowledged. It is not surprising then to find that creators of these technologies are themselves cautious about their use. Steve Jobs, the creator of the iPad, did not allow his children to use it. “We don’t allow the iPad in the home. We think it’s too dangerous for them in effect,” he admitted. Similarly, Bill Gates upheld strict rules on the use of technology in his home.

These technologies, with social media and innumerable apps, have an uncanny way of deceiving us into believing we are living full lives, while robbing us of the very essence of what makes life beautiful and worthwhile. We feel as though we’ve seen the most breathtaking beach sunsets, while in reality we never left our cozy bed and never got to smell the ocean breeze or taste the salty water as the waves crash into us. We feel like we’ve shared a laugh with

someone simply by choosing a laughing emoji. We’re able to be

there for a struggling friend by merely copying and pasting a nice quote. And we get to feel like a real hero when we have a gift or flowers delivered to a loved one’s home. It’s easy to post curated and edited

photos of our lives on social media, and for a moment, we feel like our lives are flawless.

But in all our instant and convenient connection with people through social media and our phones, we are still left feeling the gaping longing for deep connection.
